



Thalassemia major boy dies after blood transfusion

RAJKOT: A 17-year-old boy suffering from thalassemia major died after blood transfusion in Raikot Civil Hospital on Thursday night. Deceased Mayur Maradia was a resident of Ashapuranagar on Kotharia Road in the city. His parents alleged that their son died due to blood units bought from a private blood bank in the city. The body was sent for forensic postmortem to ascertain the cause of death. Mayur's father Jenti Maradia said they bought blood units from a blood bank located in Jagnnath area on Thursday as B positive blood group was not available in the civil hospital. Mayur, who was born with thalassemia major (a genetic blood disorder), had been undergoing transfusion blood fortnight. every "As soon as the blood transfusion began, his blood pressure decreased and he started to shiver. Doctors attending on him stopped the blood transfusion and they began other medication. However, Mayur died late on Thursday. We suspect that his death was caused due to the blood bought from private blood bank," Maradia alleged. units The private blood bank officials said that as soon as they came to know about the incident, they brought back the remaining blood units and sent them for a laboratory test. The report is expected to come within two they days. said

Police have registered a case of accidental death. They said once the laboratory and forensic reports arrive, they will launch an extensive investigation in the case.



Landmark study major step towards securing affordable IPV


NEJM-published study demonstrates efficacy of IPV at 1/5th of regular dose

On 31 January 2012, the New England Journal of Medicine published the results of a landmark study that could lead the way in securing affordable inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) for all countries. The study evaluated the efficacy of a fractional dose of IPV (1/5th of a full dose) administered intradermally, compared to a full dose delivered intramuscularly. The results showed that vaccinating infants with a single fractional dose of IPV can induce priming and seroconversion in more than 90% of immunized infants - rates similar to those achieved with the full dose of IP\/ These results are extremely significant, particularly in helping secure a lasting polio-free world, through implementation of the new Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan 2013-2018. This new Plan, currently being finalized by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), addresses long-term poliovirus risks, notably circulating vaccine-derived polioviruses (cVDPVs), even as the remaining strains of wild poliovirus transmission are being interrupted. Within that context, the Plan outlines preparations needed for an eventual switch from trivalent oral polio vaccine (OPV) to bivalent OPV in routine immunization programmes. Availability in all countries of at least one dose of IPV is a key prerequisite for such a switch, as recommended by the Strategic Advisory Group of Experts on immunization (SAGE). Recognizing that current costs of IPV are substantially higher than OPV, the GPEI is studying a range of affordable IPV strategies. The results of this study are a significant step towards ensuring the availability of affordable IPV for all countries around the time of a switch from trivalent OPV to bivalent OPV. More than 35,000 Rotarians from 181 countries and geographical areas converged on Bangkok, Thailand, in May for the 2012 RI Convention. They celebrated successes in the campaign to eradicate polio (see above), and left with renewed energy to continue the fight against the crippling disease.
