
NAVI MUMBAI: At the annual Walkathon held in Vashi on Saturday, hundreds of residents from Navi Mumbai walked with the aim to make the city friendly for walkers.

At the end of the hour-long walk, initiated byRotary International and the traffic control branch of Navi Mumbai, 29- year-old Mohini Sharma, who suffers from Spinal Muscular Atrophy Type II since birth was felicitated for her achievements and her determination to be who she is today, despite the odds

Kamothe-based Mohini was diagnosed with the condition when she was six months old. It was a struggle for her and her family to accept this, even more so, since her younger brother, Gaurav, too, suffers from the same affliction and is almost always bedridden. "At first, it was very hard for me, especially since I was unable to walk. Eventually, I learnt to cope with my disability," she said.

She initially attended the Society for the Education of the Crippled, then finished schooling from the Delhi Open School and finally enrolled for a correspondence graduate course with Mumbai University and is now a successful B Com graduate. Although wheelchair-bound, it doesn't stop her from pursuing her passions.

"I currently work for an internet-based marketing firm. I also do a bit of freelance writing and dabble in tarot card readings," she said. With a married elder sister, both Mohini and her brother Gaurav, need special care. "My brother is almost bed ridden. Although he is a graphic artist, he is unable to sit up for long. Both of us rely on our parents," she said. The award given to her was from the Kanchan Foundation where she volunteers. She hopes that in her own way she has inspired people to change their perception towards the physically challenged.

There being no other business, President terminated the meeting.



Emine's story

About ten years ago, an ambitious literacy campaign was started in our region using the Concentrated Language Encounter (CLE) method. Like all other clubs, my club Sisli participated with great enthusiasm, running a course for women in one of Istanbul's slum neighborhoods.

On graduation day, one young woman who was among those to receive their certificates captured everyone's attention. She had both her lower arms missing, and as her certificate was placed under her armpit, Emine timidly asked her instructor to get the sheet of paper she kept in her pocket. It was a thank-you letter written to the person who taught her to read and write.

We couldn't help but think, "She could read, yes, but how could she possibly write?" The instructor thanked her for her lovely letter, and also thanked the friend who had helped her write it, at which point Emine was furious.

"I wrote it myself," she protested, "give me a pencil and a piece of paper, and I'll show you how."

And to our amazement, she wrote down the first sentence of her letter using a pencil she clutched between her toes. As we tried hard to hold back the tears and overcome our astonishment, her classmates were cheering and applauding.

A Rotary moment is when the magic happens.

If you're curious, the sequel to this story went like this: The Istanbul Rotary Club fitted Emine with state-of-the-art prosthetic arms, which operated by receiving and interpreting signals from her brain. She started to wear a watch, something she had longed for all her life. She continued to work hard on her literacy skills, and finally become a CLE teacher herself.
